Patent Pro Bono Program

- Matches financially under-resourced inventors and small businesses with registered patent attorneys to file and prosecute patent applications.
 - 22 regional programs across the country provide matching services.

Benefits

- Helps ensure that no deserving invention lacks patent protection because of a lack of money for IP counsel.
- Educates inventors.
- Creates a path for inventors to become job creators.
- Patent practitioners can volunteer in their area of expertise.

Inventor Qualifications


- Income below 3X federal poverty guidelines.
- Show knowledge of the patent system by taking intro course: <u>https://www.uspto.gov/video/cbt/certpck/index.htm.</u>
- Have more than an idea.
- Pay all USPTO filing fees.

Practitioner participation

Admission Requirements

- Gross household income of < 300% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines*
- Responsible for <u>all</u> USPTO fees
- Have a provisional application on file <u>and/or</u> complete a certificate training course

- More than an idea
- Apply directly to regional program (preferred) or Federal Circuit Bar National Clearinghouse


Practitioner Recruitment

- Practitioners are the Linchpin
 - Demand for services always outpaces supply
 - To date, more than 1,800 attorneys are available to volunteer
- Improved patent quality a pro se inventor is now a represented inventor
- Greater access to professional advice
 - The inventor is educated about the patent system
 - "No" may be what the inventor needs to hear
 - Advice by a patent professional may help the inventor make better decisions
- Gives financially under-resourced inventors an opportunity to be job creators and, possibly, paying clients.




Examples of Inventors Commercialized through the PPBP

Practitioner Recognition

Patent practitioners critical to success

 USPTO has recognized more than 85 practitioners that provided 50+ hours of patent pro bono service in CY 17.

Certificate Recognition Award Program for 2018

- Recognize volunteers that provide 50 or more hours of patent pro bono service in CY 18
 - Volunteers report hours to regional program administrators
 - Administrators notify the USPTO of qualified volunteers
 - USPTO issues certificate to practitioner recognizing achievement
 - Patent practitioner name, firm, and regional program are posted on USPTO website
 - Signed by Commissioner for Patents and Director of OED





Law Firm/Corporation Recognition

- New in 2018!!
- Expansion of Individual Achievement Certificate to Law Firms/Corporations
- Based on cumulative hours/firm and firm size
- Same reporting procedure as Individual
- Signed by Commissioner for Patents and Director of OED
