I am writing in response to the Federal Register Notice for a Request for Comments on Additional USPTO Satellite Offices for the Nationwide Workforce Program (Docket No. PTO-C-2011-0066).

I would like to provide you with additional letters of support from Colorado business leaders for a USPTO satellite office in Colorado. In addition to the Colorado package that was submitted on Friday, January 27<sup>th</sup>, these letters continue to support the strong and growing interest from Coloradans. These letters are from emerging to established companies representing the aerospace, financial, technology, bioscience, investor, legal, and construction sectors.
